## WHAT TO EXPECT FROM A NEW HOME INSPECTION

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The day of your new home inspection has arrived!

They will bring their own ladder, camera, flashlight and an AC outlet circuit tester. He/she will take pictures and make notes as they move from room-to-room throughout the home.

The home inspector will physically review the home from roof to foundation. In addition, they will test all windows, faucets, outlets, AC, furnace and other appliances to make sure they are in working order. The buyer does not need to be present during the inspection, but a REALTOR®, either the seller's or buyer's agent, should be present to allow access to the home for the inspector. As the buyer, it is helpful to be present on the day of inspection because the REALTOR® will be able to show you exactly what the inspector will reference in their final report.

Inspection Reports. Soon after the inspection, you will receive an e-mail or printed document from your inspector or REALTOR®, containing all of the information that the inspector gathered about the house during the inspection. The report will include all details from the physical inspection, whether they be positive, negative, or neutral. All this information is necessary in order to make a well-informed decision on whether to proceed with buying the house. Some items covered in your inspection report may be issues that can be repaired by the owner/seller or result in an agreement being made about who will

pay for the repairs (the buyer or the seller). Other imperfections found by your inspector may be significant enough that you choose not to purchase the home.

What to look for in an inspector. There are many things to look for in a home inspector. The house you're about to buy is your future home, so there is quite a bit at stake. Buying a home is a big decision, so it is important to have a qualified professional inspector make an accurate and detailed report of all things they noticed about your home. It is important for the inspector to be an objective third party, so there is no bias in the final report.
